**National Test**



The 2011 National Test for Stds. 1 and 3 in will take place on **Tuesday 28<sup>th</sup> June** and the Std. 2 and 4 National Tests will take place on **Wednesday 29<sup>th</sup> June** at the school. Once again, the Std. 1 & 3 students will be tested in Mathematics and Language Arts (which includes creative writing, grammar, comprehension, vocabulary and spelling). The Std. 2 & 4 students

will be tested in General Science and Social Studies. Mock tests are being administered to prepare the students for these important tests. Also, the Third Term Test for all classes (except 1<sup>st</sup> Year and Std. 5) will begin on Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> June. You will receive a timetable soon. Remember that this test can determine your daughter or ward's eligibility for promotion. You are expected to assist with revision of the year's work (***you should have been helping her to revise throughout the academic year, however***). Please remember to be positive, patient and encouraging, praising her efforts as you go along.

**GRADUATION CEREMONY**



This year's Graduation ceremony will be held **on Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> June** at All Saints' Church. The staff has taken the decision to delink the Graduation from the Awards ceremony of the rest of the school. Therefore, only the Std. 5 students, their parents and the teachers will attend the ceremony on June 15<sup>th</sup>. Another ceremony, called Achievement Day, will be held in September or October of the new academic year to recognize student achievement of the 2010-2011 year.

**SUCCESS IN SCHOOL**

**How Parents Can Help**

**You are your child's first and most important teacher.** The following are some steps you can take to strengthen her chances for a good education.

- 1. Tell your child: Education comes first.** Parents' examples, attitude and expectations can make all the difference.
- 2. Read to and with your child.** Start in the pre-school years and never stop.
- 3. Find out what your school is teaching.** Make sure it has high standards centered on the academic basics. Help your child meet those standards.
- 4. Pay attention to character at home and at school.** Virtues and values such as responsibility, respect and hard work are essential to academic success.
- 5. Find out how the school expects its students to behave.** Read the vision, mission, rules and codes of conduct and help your child to understand as well as comply with them. If the school is not a disciplined place, little learning will occur.
- 6. Keep in close touch with teachers.** Meet with them, telephone them, write to them. Heed and respond to their messages. Lend a hand.
- 7. Pay attention to homework.** Make sure your child does it and takes it seriously. Review and sign completed assignments.
- 8. Teach your child good study habits.** Set up a quiet, well-lit study area, schedule regular study times and get rid of distractions.
- 9. Look after your child's health.** See that she gets a good night's sleep and eats a nutritious breakfast.
- 10. Control the television set.** Mostly, turn it off.
